We all Live in a Watershed



Watersheds contain all things, including us. We are made 50%-70% of water. We need 5 pints of water per day. That makes 1,825 pints per year and if you multiply that by 7.2 billion people... well, that's a lot of water. Even though 75% of the Earth is made of water, only 1% is drinkable. Water is second in the resources that make life possible, oxygen is the first. Water is only recycled through the water cycle. Therefore, we need to keep our water clean so it stays drinkable.

A watershed is the land that is drained by a stream, river, or lake. So to keep our water clean, we need to watch out what we do in watersheds. Our activity has a big effect on watersheds. We are not the only ones who live in watersheds, birds, animals, and fish do too! All of the actions we take in watersheds affect our natural resources as well. There are many ways we can pollute our water. There are 2 kinds of water pollution called point source and non-point source pollution. Point source pollution means that you can point to the source of the pollution. For example, a factory's discharge pipe. Non-point source pollution means that the pollution comes from many different places such as runoff from paved parking lots. Both of these kinds of pollution can have a negative effect on a watershed and could result in terrible water qualities.



There are ways to prevent this from happening, however, without going against farmers. These are called Best Management Practices (BMPs). BMPs address water quality using conventional methods. An example of a conventional method is a stormwater pond. A stormwater pond increases good water quality by reducing the sediment in the water. An important way to improve the water quality is reducing erosion which reduces sediment and therefore reduces nutrient levels which keeps the water clean.

Also, it is important to filter the water in some way. A few examples of how to do this are riparian buffers, grassed waterways, and filter strips. Riparian buffers are trees and plants that are placed on both sides of a stream. This BMP filters the water through its roots and prevents erosion by slowing the rain before it hits the ground. Grassed waterways are placed where a stream goes downhill. The grass slows the water flow and spreads out the stream to reduce erosion. Filter strips are located between crop fields and streams. Filter strips filter out contaminants from runoff.

In conclusion, watersheds are very important in the survival of mankind and are easily polluted by our actions. Therefore, we need to take care of the watershed we live in and help keep the water qualities in good conditions. The best way to do this is using BMPs which increase water qualities by filtering the water and reducing erosion. Watersheds are our home and we need to do our best to take care of them!

Sydni Smith Wins 2nd Place in State Level Speech Competition

Sydni Smith, an 8th grade student from Glade Creek Elementary School, won 2nd place in the soil and water conservation State Level Public Speaking Contest on May 6th in Raleigh.

Students competing at this level have advanced through three and sometimes four tiers of competition to represent their area against winners from across North Carolina.

Sydni was awarded \$100 for her hard work and dedication in reaching this level of competition. Speeches must be from four to six minutes in length and demonstrate comprehensive subject knowledge, originality and the skillful use of facts. Contestants are also judged on appropriate body language, voice, diction and style.

Alleghany teams compete in NW Envirothon

The Northwest Envirothon Competition, sponsored by the Area 2 Soil and Water Conservation Districts, was held Thursday, April 7, 2016, at the McGee Center in Wilkes County. This program is a competitive event in which high school and middle school teams compete in a natural resources and ecology field day. The competition covered the following resource subjects: forestry, soils, aquatics, wildlife, and current environmental issues.

A total of 61 teams, representing 9 of the 13 counties in Area 2, participated in this year's event. Alleghany had 20 teams registered for the event: 2 teams from Alleghany High School: "Locos Lobos" and "Perspicacious Canines", team advisor, Danny Jones; 2 teams from the Blue Ridge Christian School: "Enviromental Warfare" and "Swmp Stompers", team advisor Elizabeth Davis; 7 teams from Glade Creek School: "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles", "The Fanatastic Four", "Dark Side of the Moon", "The Plantarians", "Environmental Awesomeness", "The Top Class" and "Bandits", team advisors Hope McClure and Melissa Gibson; 4 teams from Piney Creek School: "Science Warriors", "Swarm", "Fossilized Flowers" and "Pizza Dragons, team advisor Becky Sanders; 5 teams from Sparta School: "The Rebels", "The Minks", "EnviroBubles", "Green Warriors", and "The Untouchables", team advisors Rochelle Todd, Jessica Holyfield and Chris Brady.

The seven highest scoring teams in middle school and high school advance to the state competition. In the middle school competition, the "Science Warriors" from Piney Creek took 1st place and the "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" took 3rd place.
